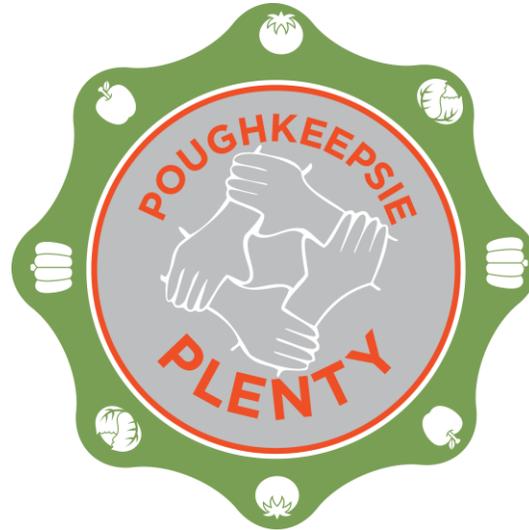


# Poughkeepsie Plenty Food Coalition

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
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# City of Poughkeepsie Ward Map

## Issue 1: Support for the Poughkeepsie Plenty Fresh Market

Lance Hardy	As mayor, it is my desire to revitalize the City of Poughkeepsie to the beautiful city it can be; however, it is more important to me to have a beautiful city that is not suffering from food insecurities. The state of being without reliable access to a sufficient quantity of affordable, nutritious food is a primary concern.	High	Food security is of great concern to me as Mayor, more so as a leader in the community, parent, husband, minister and concerned resident. I would like to see the city revitalize from crime, drugs, abandonment and a few other issues; but, food security and better income is a step in reducing those issues as well.
Randall Johnson	Solving food insecurity and economic revitalization of the City do not necessarily go hand-in-hand. Food insecurity per se does not impact revitalization plans. Other cities that have undergone revitalization or that are experiencing an economic boom still have a food-insecure population. That does not mean that food-insecure residents are unaffected by a revitalization. Economic revitalization will help some food-insecure families by providing opportunities for those who are not currently well-employed. Unfortunately, many of the people who are food insecure would still be food insecure because their food insecurity is not related to a lack of economic opportunities, but is related to other causes such as mental and physical health and age-related issues, which economic revitalization will not resolve. However, what economic revitalization would do is provide the City with revenue that could be directed toward helping those food-insecure people who are not able to take advantage of an economic revitalization. It is also worth noting that part of economic revitalization, at least in my vision, includes improved public transportation and removal of or surmounting of access barriers such as the arterial that	Medium	On a personal level it is a very high priority because I care about people. But your question asks how I would prioritize food insecurity as mayor. I have to be honest; as mayor I cannot make food insecurity a high priority. I need to first address other root problems that exist, namely a budget deficit, insufficient revenue, and economic revitalization. Solving these problems will have a ripple effect. It will provide revenue that can be directed toward solving many of the issues that affect our food-insecure population. But it does no good to say that addressing food insecurity is a very high priority knowing that other than speaking about it, there is little to nothing that the city can currently afford to do to address that problem. The city cannot even afford to hire the firefighters and police it needs to protect our residents, including the food insecure.

Robert Rolison	Yes	It would bring much-needed attention to the issue in the City of Poughkeepsie and marshal additional resources to fix the problem. More public dialogue leads to better public-policy outcomes.	I would emphasize a two-track approach to the problem, allocating resources at the local level and lobbying the federal government to take action where it can. First, additional partnerships to promote and support Poughkeepsie Plenty's efforts to reduce food insecurity are necessary to include more at-risk communities that may be falling through the cracks. (Take, for instance, the statistic that more than one in four Poughkeepsie households experiences food insecurity.) Second, food-stamp rules need to be modified at the federal level to address gaps in allocation -- policy should reflect the realities of how many people actually live. This would include working with members of Congress and others to change SNAP benefits to semi-monthly instead of simply a one-time transfer. Third, full employment increases the available supply of better food choices, and I would emphasize economic growth as an overall

Randall Johnson	Yes	<p>My answer is “probably but I have not investigated the issue and have no facts from which to draw a conclusion of yes or no.”</p> <p>The city has many overwhelming issues, such as insufficient numbers of police and firefighters, that affect all residents, including the food insecure. As mayor, I need to prioritize based on what I think can actually be accomplished, which means I have to proceed on a fact basis. This is an issue that I need to investigate, rather than simply check a yes or no box.</p>	<p>It is not for the mayor to propose for private business to stock particular items, rather it is for groups like yours to bring social pressure on those businesses to bring about the change you desire. A fundamental “law” of our economic system is that businesses will carry those goods that its shoppers demand be carried. I think groups like yours should create the incentives, not the mayor. You keep comparing Poughkeepsie to cities like San Francisco that have a hundred times (or more) the population and an infinitely greater economic base than Poughkeepsie. Although it would be great if we could emulate those metropolitan areas, we cannot. The repercussions of what we enact legislatively, such as decreeing that a business must carry certain food items, can boomerang and cause even more businesses to flee the short distance to the surrounding town. What I would do is use the “bully pulpit” to encourage small businesses to address the problem, but I would not create specific “incentives.”</p>	<p>It is not the position of the mayor to promote one business over the other. As mayor I will promote all businesses. It is groups like yours that should do the promoting. This is particularly true considering the city’s current economic plight and lack of revenue.</p>
